On August 18, 2023, St. Croix Trail Blazers found themselves at the Summer Sports Classic for Special Olympics Minnesota

Equestrian Competition. We took a team of 24 riders, 12 horses, 15 staff, and four drivers and trailers.

with this year's athlete numbers a bit lower at 48 compared to past years. Equestrian can be a hard sport to maintain

The oldest horse to ever live lived to the age of 62.



It was originally thought horses couldn't see colors, but it turns out they can see yellows and greens pretty well, just not purple and violet tones.










Horses' teeth take up more space in their skull than their brain does.

That's a lot of spit...ewww...




Horse hooves are made out of the same protein as human hair and nails.



Horses can't breathe through their mouths.

They can only breathe through their nostrils.



Horses can walk and run very soon after birth.

After a few hours they are normally up and about.



Horses have ten muscles in each of their ears and they coordinate their eyes and ears.

This allows them to turn each ear independently up to 180°. Wherever the horse's ear is pointing is the direction their eye on the same side is looking. If they are pointing in two different directions, they're actually looking at two different things simultaneously.



A horse can momentarily float.

When a horse gallops, they have all four hooves off the ground at one point. Don't worry, we don't gallop.



Horses can sleep standing up or laying down.



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The horses' closest living relative is the Rhino.

Both belong to the mammal group "perissodactyls" (a mammal group with an odd number of toes). Most mammals from this group are extinct, and the Rhino is one of few that remain.



Horses can be cloned.

The first horse cloned was born in Italy in 2003 and was a Haflinger cross mare named Prometea.
